I am **Delores Allegne**—a cradle Episcopalian, a woman of enduring faith, and a lifelong advocate for dignity, justice, and hope. For over 65 years, I have been an active member of the Girls' Friendly Society, walking alongside generations of women and girls in prayer, service, and sisterhood. My journey has taken me from parish halls to global platforms, including the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women, where I listened deeply to stories of fear, hurt, and abuse and witnessed the unshakable faith that carried survivors through unimaginable pain.

This Prayers of Hope booklet is a reflection of that journey. It gathers prayers from my GFS sisters, my colleagues in advocacy, and my own heart, each one born from a place of truth, resilience, and sacred longing. These prayers are not just words; they are lifelines. They speak to the power of belief, the strength of community, and the healing presence of God in our lives.

I believe always that with God; all things are possible. That belief has sustained me through decades of service, through moments of joy and sorrow, and through the quiet work of lifting others up. It is my hope that these prayers will do the same for you. May they comfort you, challenge you, and call you into deeper faith and action.

I feel so strongly about creating this booklet of prayers of hope because I believe that hope is not just a feeling; it is a lifeline. This booklet is my offering to those who need to be reminded that they are not alone, that light still breaks through, and that healing is possible. Each prayer is a whisper of solidarity, a call to courage, and a testament to the power of faith shared across generations. It is my way of honoring the voices that have been silenced, uplifting those who continue to rise, and planting seeds of hope for those yet to come.

# OPENING MESSAGE TO OUR GFS SISTERS

For the 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence

## Dear Gisters in Christ,

This prayer booklet is lovingly dedicated to the girls and women known and unknown who have suffered at the hands of others through any form of gender-based violence. Their pain calls us to prayer, reflection, and action.

Abuse, whether verbal, emotional, physical, sexual, or psychological, can leave deep wounds that medicine alone cannot heal. The spiritual and emotional scars often linger far beyond the actual events. But prayer invites God into the healing process. It is in prayer that we find sacred space to lament, to listen, and to begin again.

Abuse can strip a woman of her identity, value, and voice, but it cannot take away her worth in God's eyes. She remains

beloved, whole, and held. Through these prayers, we affirm that no act of violence can erase the divine imprint on her life.

Each year, the 25th of November,
International Day for the Elimination of
Violence Against Women, marks the
beginning of our 16 Days of Activism.
During this sacred time, the Girls' Friendly
Society joins hands across continents,
united in our mission to raise awareness
and call for an end to violence and
injustice against girls and women.

We do not walk alone. GFS Worldwide continues to lift up Prayers of Hope, echoing the voices of survivors and advocates, until we gather in Sri Lanka for the World Council in July 2026. Our prayers are a bridge between heartbreak and healing, silence and solidarity.

As we wear our orange ribbons, we do so with conviction:

- As a symbol of peace.
- As a public commitment to never commit, condone, or remain silent about violence against women and girls.
- As a sign that the Lord strengthens us not only to pray, but to act.

- To every advocate who speaks truth, holds space, and walks beside others in healing.
- To members of GFS worldwide, may these prayers serve as a source of comfort, an encouragement to act, and a recognition of our collective strength.



## HOPE IN TROUBLED TIMES: A REFLECTION

In recent months, we've seen a world stretched thin—communities rebuilding after storms and fires, families fleeing violence, nations wrestling with uncertainty. Beneath these headlines are the quieter burdens people carry every day: illness, grief, fear, and loneliness. Yet even amid all this, grace still shows up—neighbors helping neighbors, strangers offering kindness, communities choosing compassion. These small lights remind us that hope still breathes. Scripture understands hope born in hardship. The Psalmist, weary and overwhelmed, asks, "Why are you cast down, O my soul?" and then answers, "Hope in God" (Psalm 42:5). Hope doesn't deny our pain; it turns us toward the One who holds us in it. Jeremiah speaks this same assurance to exiles who felt uprooted and uncertain: "I know the plans I have for you... to give you a future with hope" (Jeremiah 29:11). Their circumstances hadn't changed, but God's promise met them where they were. Paul reminds us that hope often grows slowly—"suffering produces endurance... and

r:

endurance produces hope" (Romans 5:3–5). This is especially true for those carrying hidden wounds, victims of violence, abuse, and trauma. For them, hope is God's gentle promise: I see you. I hear you. I am near to the brokenhearted (Psalm 34:18).

The early Church grounded this hope in the resurrection. Peter calls it "a living hope" (1 Peter 1:3)—a hope that rises with Christ. So even in our own troubled world, hope remains possible. This resurrection-shaped hope does not erase our pain; it assures us that God meets us in it with steadfast love.

Isaiah gives voice to that promise: "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you" (Isaiah 43:2). God may not remove every deep water, but God never lets us face them alone. So hope in troubled times looks like trusting God's presence in the midst of uncertainty. It looks like small acts of courage and compassion, prayers whispered in hard moments, and solidarity with those who suffer.

And above all, hope rests on this unshakable truth: nothing "will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:38–39).

Trouble may shape our days, but it does not define our story. God's love **does—and that love remains our enduring hope.**


Heavenly Father,


